USDF is excited to introduce the new USDF Regional Schooling Show Awards Program. This program starts December 1, 2019 and offers regional recognition to USDF Group Members competing in participating non-USEF-licensed/non-USDF-recognized competitions.

All non-USEF-licensed/non-USDF-recognized competitions are invited to participate in this program. To participate, simply submit the <u>online application</u> and \$25 participation fee to USDF at least 30 days prior to the start of the competition. The program year will be December 1 through November 30.

An online competition calendar will list participating competitions on the USDF website. Participating competitions must submit a copy of their prize list to USDF no later than 14 days prior to the competition and competition results must be submitted to USDF within 21 days of the end date of the competition.

INSTRUCTOR OF THE MONTH ALLY GRILLO SALTONSTALL

Alexandra Grillo Saltonstall is our teacher of the month for December. Ally runs her own boarding, training and rehabilitation stable in the tiny hamlet of King Ferry on the east side of Cayuga Lake. Like many of us, she came up as a hunter rider in New Jersey and switched her focus to dressage ten years ago when she bought her home, Sweet Reverie Farm, in New York. She credits her mother-in-law, Tacie Saltonstall, for encouraging her to pursue dressage training on a very serious level. Through Tacie, Ally met and trained with Betsy Steiner who "took me back to the real basic concepts of dressage to give me a great foundation to work from." Among her early mentors are her first riding instructor, Ellen Ryan, who set the stage for her career as a farm owner and trainer. Ally spent countless hours as her shadow starting from a very young age all the way until she moved



to Ithaca to attend college. Ryan continues to be an important resource for Ally. "To this day I still call her for advice, encouragement, and just to have fun conversations about our horses!"

Over the past few years, Ally has devoted a great deal of her time and resources learning from her friend and mentor Kimberley Dougherty, the head trainer of Canterbury Stables. Thanks to the Canterbury relationship she has been able to ride in clinics and/or audit under some really amazing trainers such as Niall Quirk and Lee Tubman. She is particularly fond of training with Felicitas von Neumann-Cosel and does so on a regular basis. Kimberley and Felicitas have played a large roles in helping her train her newest dancing partner, a four-year-old Lusitano gelding named Luxor.

I nominated Ally as teacher of the month because I have been working with her for the past year. I can attest to her thorough foundation and deep understanding of the mechanics of both horse and rider I have benefitted from her knowledge in many ways. One of the things I enjoy about working with Ally is that she has taken me back to those basics and I have started to understand on an experiential level what dressage training is really all about. I've only ridden with a handful of trainers and clinicians in the last seven years or so when I returned to horses and riding and I have gotten valuable information from all of them. Most of that early experience was on my old mare, Calandria, who, I now know, had the patience of a saint as I learned the ins and outs of dressage riding. Things changed drastically for me, as I have written in my monthly notes, when I started riding my young mare, GG Marquez. That is how Ally and I came together. Ally has been a voracious student of technique and seems able to answer just about any question I put to her. I have never been afraid to ask a dumb question or had to pretend I understood what was being said during lessons. The fact that she has been bringing babies along for the last few years helps a great deal. As I mentioned before, she now has a four-year-old Lusitano gelding and GG Marquez and I have benefitted greatly from the work Ally is doing with "Lux." In lessons Ally is highly focused

and always seems to have a plan for what we need to focus next when I arrive at the barn. Our work is consistent and we tackle issues one at a time rather than trying to fix everything in every lesson. I always have a clear sense of my homework when I head home from a lesson and she is always prepared to build on any progress we (might) make from week to week at home.

When asked to pin point her "most proud dressage moment" she responded in her typically modest manner: "I get such great joy out of small victories and moments. For instance, when I feel my horse and I are communicating well and I've been able to teach him something new. The moment he "gets it" brings such happiness!" As a self-described perfectionist, you may not recognize her as someone hanging on the warm -up rail or even riding down the centerline at the shows in our area - yet! Patience is one of her strongest attributes, and she has not begun to pursue any medals or much of a show career since coming here. Instead, she has been passionately creating a richly experienced, impressive circle of teachers that she works with on a regular basis. As a self-described "perfectionist," Ally will be bringing her new partner out to shows when she if confident that she has given him a strong foundation and that they are working together to the best of their shared abilities. In the meantime, you can find this soft-spoken and patient young trainer hard at work, focused and consistent, on the ground, or in the saddle any day of the week at her farm in King Ferry.

CLINIC NOTES

Felicitas von Neumann- Cosel November 23, 2019, Canterbury stables, Cazenovia, NY by Karen Steffy

- · There is no cruise control on a horse, you are constantly giving little aids
- Riding a circle is like riding the top of a volcano. The inside leg keeps the horse from falling into the fire. The outside aids keep the horse from falling off the cliff.
- Without lateral flexion in the poll, there is not give in the ribcage

June 2, 2019. Canterbury stables, Cazenovia, NY

- Play with the inside rein and allow the horse to stretch
- It is not the leg that takes the horse forward, but the hips
- The leg shapes the horse
- When the horse is resistant, send the energy forward
- Half halt the horse's chest, not the head


