

openings are, you may see space. We look for space and breath in uncomfortable postures in yoga. We try new things. We are grateful for what we can do. Showing up on the mat is a huge step in the right direction. This morning, I took what she said and applied it to my riding. It was 70 and humid, and had rained the night before, so the ground was slippery. (I don't have an indoor.) The bugs were also annoying. But, Draco and I are better if we do at least a little something every day. My goal was to just walk and let him stretch for a bit. Then, I started thinking about freedom, as it ap-



plies to riding. Where was I not free? In my right hip and seat bone, for sure. My left side was better. So, Draco just kept walking and I kept checking in on my position randomly. It was amazing how often I found my right hip stuck, or my seat not following. The more freedom I gave to my right seat bone, the better he walked. I know this stuff. It's not new. Somehow, I had forgotten it. I rode for half an hour, with him on the buckle and me working on the freedom in my seat. What could have been a wasted morning, turned into one of enlightenment.

So, find your freedom in your riding. Find where there is openness in a stuck situation. Appreciate what you can do. Be grateful that you are able to ride. Honor your horse with love.

FLORIDA 2018 ADVENTURE

I was lucky to spend three months in Florida this winter on an equine adventure with my 7 year old Hanoverian gelding BeowulffWW (Wulff) and my two Cairn Terriers, Aoife and Rian. Wulff was stabled with Lauren Chumley at Alice Tarjan's beautiful Bramblefields South Farm in White Fences, Loxahatchee. I stayed in an Air B&B near the West Palm Beach Airport. Wulff went to Lauren Chumley in New Jersey in order to ride on the "school bus" with his new friends the week before Christmas. I left several days ahead of schedule due to the ice storms predicted for the East Coast. The pups and I settled in and explored our new neighborhood. There was an inviting town park nearby which had a chipped Parcour Course. We walked or ran there every morning, did the series of exercises and chased all the squirrels away. I was 10 minutes away from the public beach, the City Center with wonderful restaurants and shopping and my favorite place to have a drink, the Breakers Hotel.



Wulff and 24 of his new team mates arrived on the 28th of December having ridden with Kevin Hennesy's Nobody's Business Farm transport. He got his first all over body clip (not happy about it either) along with all the other hairy beasts. Lauren had 25 horses in training that she rides, competes and sells. She has three of the nicest most industrious working students: Jesse Hayes, Jessica Spracklin and Natasha Sprengers- Levine. These four women work far harder than you can imagine. They feed, clean and take care of all 25 horses. The breeds range from Fjiord ponies to Warmbloods, Morgans and Connemaras. The horses worked 5 days a week and we hacked around the White Fences Circle on Saturdays. Everyone had Mondays off. Wulff and I had our first lesson on January 30th and we were on our way! It was very exciting to me as I had always dreamed of riding in Florida.

I would spend the afternoon at the barn. I could watch Alice Tarjan ride her amazing string of horses. That was an education in and of itself. Lauren and her working students would be working their horses. I could watch their lessons and training sessions. I saw horses just being started under saddle up to Grand Prix. I had four lessons a week and Lauren rode Wulff one day to start his changes. He had a tendency to



"click his heels" behind his ears when he started so I was grateful to be on the ground for that part of the program. Wulff and I showed three times at White Fences. Lauren has a great system. She would take her four horse trailer with the first ones to show on board. Her two horse trailer would ferry horses back and forth to the farm when it was their turn. I was in awe as she and Jesse would show 8 or 9 horses and never miss a beat. Jessica and Natasha also would come and show their horses and then go right back to work.

On weekends, I would go to the Global show grounds and watch all the different classes. I also enjoyed watching the jumping at WEF. Friday nights at WEF is a big family style party while the Grand Prix jumping goes on. I went to a series of talks sponsored by Show Chic. I heard Scott Hassler speak about his philosophy of horses and training. Mary Wanless spoke about biomechanics and I won a copy of The New Anatomy of Rider Connection in a raffle. I went to Jessica Jo Tate's Yellow Bird Farm to hear Charles deKunffy speak. I won a Lisa Marie Bishop painting in a raffle. I should have purchased a lottery ticket. Every Thursday there are 20 or more food trucks in Wellington in the park. There is a tribute band so you can sample any kind of food and listen to the music. There is a cupcake truck and they will frost yours any way you like. I attended the KWPN meeting with Jessica Eagles. We visited the VDL stud to see their imported auction horses and heard Laura Graves speak. A few of the KWPN members went to the Renegade Bar for line dancing but that is a story for another time.
